Dear Friends,

Whenever we join in a creed, such as the Confirmation Creed that our Confirmation Class prepared this past month, we affirm that we believe *in God . . . in Jesus Christ . . .* and *in the Holy Spirit*.

We have an understanding of God, the creator of all things.

We have a clear picture of Jesus, the Savior of the world.

But what exactly is the Holy Spirit?

The "third person of the Trinity" is the most difficult to grasp. Yet according to the book of Acts, it was the Holy Spirit that inspired and empowered the early Christians to do all that they did. Are we missing something? Do we need, in our own lives, a fresh experience of the Holy Spirit?

This summer in worship we will embark into a sermon series entitled, "Catch the Wind," in which we will explore in depth what the Holy Spirit is and how the Holy Spirit can be genuinely at work in our lives today. The series will begin on June 8, which is Children's Day at the 10:30 service. Our worship schedule for June will be as follows:

June 1 Ascension Sunday

We will celebrate the Ascension of Jesus (40 days after Easter) and its meaning for people today. Note that there will be <u>no Communion</u> on June 1, even though it is the first Sunday of the month. In June, we have no Communion at the 10:30 hour, because we have Communion twice in May at 10:30 (the second time on Confirmation Sunday), and at the 8:30 and 9:30 hours we juxtapose Communion with the Children's Day service, which this year will be on June 8.

June 8 Pentecost / Children's Day / Communion at 8:30 and 9:30

At the 10:30 hour, our Children's Choir will present the musical, "Tale of Three Trees." I will share a sermon at all three hours entitled, "God's Draft Picks." During worship we celebrate Pentecost, the day on which the Holy Spirit came with power upon the first disciples. This will be the beginning of the "Catch the Wind" sermon series.

June 15 Father's Day

The sermon series on the Holy Spirit continues with a sermon entitled, "Catch the Wind."

June 22 Rev. Douglas Denton preaching / VBS Leader Commissioning

Worship at all three hours will include a commissioning of our Vacation Bible School leaders. VBS begins on Monday, June 23!

June 29 Commissioning for Mountain T.O.P. / New members received / VBS children sing

The "Catch the Wind" sermon series continues. Vacation Bible School children will sing at 10:30, and there will be a commissioning of our Mountain T.O.P. mission team, which will depart the next Saturday. New members will be received at any of the three worship hours.

Major Capital Projects Unfold

Here is the financial picture for the major church capital projects that are unfolding in the near term:

Boiler replacement 80,000

We have been working toward this project for several years. The final cost is less than we expected! (Our initial estimates were that it could be as high as \$100,000). The lower cost is a good thing, especially because our Trustees discovered that we also need a major building-wide upgrade of our HVAC controls system (see below).

HVAC controls system upgrade 114,500

It is one thing to heat up water (what the boiler does); it is another thing deliver the heat to the right place in the building at the right time in the right amount (what the heating controls system does). As our Trustees researched our church heating plant, they found that we had major problems and inefficiencies in our controls system in numerous parts of the building. The boiler would only have the proper impact when the controls system was also upgraded. The needed upgrade to the system – involving new thermostats, electronic dampers and controls, and a fully computerized operating platform for the entire building – would cost even more than the boiler! But the net result will be significant energy savings – especially in areas such as the education wing that have been extremely inefficient – and more comfortable rooms throughout the winter. The air conditioning controls, plus parking lot lighting controls, which also does the HVAC work at Kent State University.

Campus Ministry Wing Window Replacement

A set of 50-year old windows in our campus ministry wing had deteriorated to the point that they were mostly no longer operable. Nine sets of large, vertical windows are being replaced.

Rest Room Renovations

We are proceeding with the renovation of the campus ministry wing rest rooms. These rest rooms (especially the boys') are in such bad condition that they must be renovated in order to pass the end-of-summer health inspection required for the operation of the day care in that wing. We will continue to work on additional rest rooms as more funds become available.

Debt retirement

We are committed to paying off the final debt that we owe on the 2006 building expansion.

Bus replacement

This is a new item! We purchased the bus in 2000, and were hoping to keep eking out more life from it, but the latest inspection revealed such major problems that we had to take decisive action. Fourteen years in northeast Ohio winters had taken their toll, with major rust issues on the underside of the bus, plus some mechanical problems. With rebates, discounts, and a good trade-in value on our bus (the diesel drive train was worth something, even if the body of the bus was a mess), we were able to purchase a new bus at a reasonable cost (list price was \$62,000). Our Sunday bus ministry currently has eleven regular riders, and the bus is also used in our youth ministry.

Boiler and Capital Campaign Gifts received

As of the end of the first quarter of 2014, we had roughly \$100,000 in cash on hand for our boiler plant project. Most of this consisted of funds that had been received through the "Turn Up the Heat" campaign (2011-2013). \$20,000 of the total consisted of funds received to date for the Bicentennial Campaign. 150,000

Bicentennial Pledges made but not yet received

Our Bicentennial Campaign – a two year capital campaign designed to raise the balance of the funds for the boiler project, pay off the building debt, and also fund rest room renovations - received a total of \$170,000 in pledges (the goal had been \$250,000). Of the \$170,000 in pledges, \$20,000 was paid by the end of March (reflected in the cash on hand figure above). This leaves \$150,000 that we anticipate will come in by the end of 2015, as people fulfill the pledges that they have made.

Bicentennial "Nonpledge" Giving

Many people who did not make a pledge to the Bicentennial Campaign are still making gifts to it. You can make a gift simply by marking it "Bicentennial Campaign." We estimate that we will receive at least \$15,000 in such gifts by the end of 2015.

United Christian Ministries Contribution

Our campus ministry is donating \$5000 toward the rest room renovation project and \$1000 toward the window replacement project taking place in the campus ministry wing. 87.000

Estate and Endowment Gifts

Contributions from various estates and endowments – especially the Miller, Stockdale, Wertz, and McCracken endowments – have bridged the gap and made the projects possible.

Bus Fund

Funds received many years ago from the Gallaway estate had been set aside for bus ministry. We had \$37,000 on hand, which was three-quarters of what the new bus cost. We will need to continue to raise transportation operating funds, as well as funds for the purchase of another bus out in the future!

Total Funding

This plan includes one major adjustment in the original design of the Bicentennial Campaign. We had intended for the Bicentennial Campaign to fund the renovation of all eight major church rest rooms by the end of 2015. With the campaign having fallen short of its goal, and with the need for the HVAC controls system upgrade, the new plan is to renovate two rest rooms and delay the others until more funding is received. If we receive new pledges to the Bicentennial Campaign, or more "nonpledge" gifts than we anticipated, we can proceed with additional renovations.

Notice that the big story in this funding plan is the impact of *planned giving* – people have included the church in their estate planning, and so have made an ongoing big difference in the church! See the related article in this newsletter for more information about planned giving.

New Member Orientation

The New Member Orientation is for all persons who are interested in learning more about our church and who are interested potentially in joining the church. It is led by Dr. Palmer and will take place in two sessions during the month of June.

The first session will be on Sunday, June 8, from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. This session provides an overview of the United Methodist Church. The class meets in room 200 in the education wing (the first room at the top of the stairs). Child care is offered throughout the session.

The second session will be on Saturday, June 28, from 6:00 to 8:30 p.m. This session includes a "New Member Dessert," with the desserts brought in by members of the church. The session provides a more specific orientation to our local church, plus a preparation for the worship service in which persons are received into membership. Child care is again offered throughout the session.

Persons choosing to join the church will be received into membership during any of our three worship hours on Sunday, June 29. If you (or someone you know) would be interested in being a part of this new member orientation, or if you would like more information, please be in touch with our church office.

If you need further financial assistance, see Lynnette about receiving application materials for a District or Conference campership. It is possible to get nearly the entire cost of camp covered if you have the need.

There are many, many different types of camp experiences, and there are day camps and two-day overnight camps for the younger campers.

Gluten Free Communion Bread

We have made provisions for members of our church who have gluten intolerance to receive gluten free bread for Communion. Let Dr. Palmer know ahead of time if you would like to be included among those receiving gluten free bread at any hour on Sunday morning.

The practice of providing gluten free bread carries forth the same principle that is already embodied in our United Methodist practice of providing alcoholfree "wine" (we use Welch's grape juice!) – we want <u>everyone</u> to be welcome at the Lord's table!

What Is Planned Giving?

In simple terms, "planned giving" is when people plan to include the church (or another charity) in their will. Many of our church members have planned for a certain amount of their estate to go to the church upon their death. In this way, they create a lasting legacy, as they continue to make an impact for good beyond their lifespan.

Currently, some large and very necessary capital projects in our church are being funded in part by gifts made through such planned giving. Hulda Miller, Lee Stockdale, Elizabeth McCracken, and George and Virginia Gallaway were all faithful members of our church some years ago. They all made significant gifts to the church through their wills, and those gifts are still making a major impact today. (see the related capital projects article in this newsletter)

When making a planned gift, you can designate the gift toward a specific cause – such as missions or Sunday School or the bus ministry or youth ministry – or leave it undesignated (what most donors have done). You can also set up an endowment – in which the original funds are invested and the earnings are used for future projects – or leave the funds to be available as needed.

It is possible to fund an endowment while you are still living, so that you can see the impact of the endowment right now! An example in our church is the Wertz endowment.

There are other forms of planned giving, such as a "charitable remainder trust," in which a donor contributes funds to a trust, which will pay income to the donor during the donor's life, with the balance in the trust going to the charity upon the donor's death. There are certain tax advantages with this arrangement.

Vacation Bible School


We're inviting all children to be a part of the excitement at our Vacation Bible School. This summer we have been invited to participate as a pilot church for Cokesbury's 2015 theme!
