Dear Friends.

Some years ago a book hit the New York Times Bestseller list entitled <u>Conversations with God</u>. The author, Neale Walsch, claimed to have received extensive communications from God in response to a series of questions he had written down. The book was so popular that there were eight sequels, plus a movie.

Why was the book so popular? Did God really talk to this guy? Most people upon reading the book and its sequels concluded that Walsch was hearing his own subconscious more than he was hearing God. But perhaps the very idea of the book was what was most intriguing – *we long for communication with God*.

But how can we experience <u>authentic</u> communication with God? Many people have claimed to hear a "word from God" that is entirely bogus. In the case of <u>Conversations with God</u>, Walsch seems mainly to be hearing the soundings of popular culture. The series reflects all the themes of contemporary American pop spirituality, (which explains why it gained such a readership). Thus Walsch in his books spelled out some good ideas, plus a lot of shallow and wacky ones. As Alexander Campbell (an early 19th century American preacher) once observed about Joseph Smith's <u>Book of Mormon</u>, "He has gathered almost every error and every truth discussed in New York for the past ten years."

If we long for communication with God, how can we avoid just hearing our own "inner voice" or the loud echo of all the voices in the culture around us? Perhaps the place to begin is with some **real conversations with God.** The idea that a person might have a "conversation with God" is, of course, by no means new or unique. The Biblical story is full of such conversations with God! In the Bible we find a number of inspiring and instructive cases in which people authentically heard the voice of God.

So if you wish to hear a word from God, I invite you to join me in a sermon series starting this month entitled, "Real Conversations with God." We will journey through several key Biblical stories in which people truly conversed with God, and we will find answers to central questions: Does God "talk" to people? If so, how do such "conversations" happen? How can we get ourselves into a position where we can hear God's voice? How do we know that it is God's voice we are hearing and not just our own imaginings? What sorts of things does God say in real conversations with God?

The series will begin on Sunday, January 12, and will continue until the start of Lent (the beginning of March). I look forward to sharing with you in worship, as together we seek to authentically hear what God is saying to us.

New Worship Service Finds Good Response

Last September we expanded our Sunday morning worship schedule to include a 9:30 contemporary worship service in the gymnasium. The service has received a very good response, averaging more than 60 in attendance across its first four months. The service features an outstanding praise band and includes the same sermon that is preached at the 8:30 and 10:30 hours.

Meanwhile, worship attendance at our 8:30 service remains steady, averaging around 50 per Sunday, while attendance at 10:30 continues strong, averaging nearly 300 per Sunday. We also have a Wednesday night youth worship service – with music led by Michael Goff and a message from Rick Stout – which averages about 25 per week. There will be a full **year end report** on worship attendance, membership, the church's financial condition in the February issue of the Mosaic.

Cruise with a Purpose

Davina Gosnell, who serves on the Volunteer in Mission Committee with our East Ohio Conference, is taking part in a "cruise with a purpose" in January. The cruise is sponsored by the North Central Jurisdiction (which includes United Methodist Conferences from Ohio to Minnesota) and is being led by a minister and his wife from Minnesota who have led more than 30 Volunteer in Mission teams to the Caribbean. Cruise participants will depart from Miami, Florida on the Norwegian Sun and visit 5 Methodist mission sites in St. Thomas, US Virgin Island / Roseau, Dominica / Bridgetown, Barbados / Castries, St Lucia / and Phillipsburg, St Maarten. They will be connecting with Methodist church leaders on the 5 islands. taking some needed school and medical supplies, learning about current specific needs, and assessing and making plans for recruiting and organizing future mission work teams. They will also have opportunity to worship and fellowship with Methodist congregations on the islands. An informational sheet about the specific mission goals on each island is posted on the atrium bulletin board.

Davina will be using the experience for her ongoing work on the East Ohio Conference Volunteer in Mission committee, and she will be a good resource for anyone in our church who might be interested in a future Caribbean mission opportunity. Our thoughts and prayers go with Davina as she departs on this journey!



Building Updates

Our building has been a very busy place lately, not only with all the groups and ministries that go on within it, but also with contractors fulfilling a number of tasks. Here are the most recent developments:

The **sanctuary roof repair** was completed. There had been deterioration along the north edge of the building and in some of the drainage channels along the east side.

The **Pit** (our youth room under the sanctuary) suffered water damage from the leaky sanctuary roof. Water ran down through the sanctuary walls and emptied into the Pit below, causing a mess on the wall and considerable damage to the carpet. Thanks to Rick Stout for cleaning and repainting the wall! The 17-year-old carpet, which already was very worn and stained, had to be replaced. We got a very good price on an extremely durable carpet that will be perfect for a youth room! The carpet is now installed.

The **automatic doors** in Pierson Hall and the Parlor entrance have been repaired and are now fully functioning.

A 50-year-old **freezer** in the campus ministry wing went bad and was replaced with a new unit. The **cost** for all of these projects was covered by estate funding. People have remembered our church in their will. Their funds are carefully invested and grow, and these funds then accomplish a great deal! You can learn more about such legacy gifts through our Gifts, Memorials, and Estates Committee, chaired by Kevin Patrick.

Meanwhile, engineers from five different companies have been preparing final bids for the boiler project and the HVAC maintenance and controls contract. We expect to install a new boiler system in the coming months.

The colleges are: Bennett College, Bethune-Cookman University, Claflin University, Clark Atlanta University, Dillard University, Huston-Tillotson University, Meharry Medical College, Paine College, Philander Smith College, Rust College, and Wiley College. Central Conference Pension Initiative \$25 Million Fundraising Goal Accomplished.

The Central Conference Pension Initiative (CCPI) has achieved its \$25 million challenge goal - the amount needed to fund pensions for current retirees and surviving spouses in the central conferences (those outside the United States). A recent generous donation from the General Board of Discipleship completed our fundraising - making it possible to retire the fundraising effort once all pledged contributions are received.

With the achievement of this goal, all clergy around the world, including every eligible central conference pastor, now have reliable pension support through their conference and/or government program. In January 2013, all central conferences seeking pension support through CCPI had met the necessary pension program start-up criteria. Plans are now fully funded and in operation in Africa, Asia and Europe, covering 2,801 retirees and surviving spouses. [Our Church contributed \$12,500 to this goal.]
