1st Sunday of Advent (December 1) – Epiphany Sunday (January 5)


Our United Methodist Social Principles (6 weeks)

First adopted by the 1972 General Conference, the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church reflect our shared response to today's most pressing social issues. During an eight-year time-frame, the General Board of Church and Society managed a global process toward a significant revision of these statements which was then approved by the 2024 General Conference. As 2025 begins, we will explore and discuss our Social Principles and consider opportunities for our congregation to move from discussion to advocacy, moving our faith into faithful action. Upcoming Book Discussions Inciting Joy: Essays by Ross Gay

In these gorgeously written and timely pieces, poet and author Ross Gay considers the joy we incite when we care for each other, especially through life's hard moments. Throughout Inciting Joy, taking a clear-eyed look at injustice, political polarization, and the destruction of the natural world, he explores how we might resist and how the study of joy might lead us to a wild, unpredictable, and unboundaried solidarity that will help us survive and do so with joy.

Cherished Belonging: The Healing Power of Love in Divided Times by Gregory Boyle Tuesday, January 7, at 7 pm in the Conference Room

Over the past thirty years, the Jesuit priest Gregory Boyle has helped to transform tens of thousands



of lives through his work as the founder of Homeboy Industries, the largest gang-intervention program in the world. The program runs on two unwavering principles: 1) We are all unshakably good (no exceptions), and 2) we belong to each other (no exceptions). In this new book, Boyle argues that these two principles allow all of us to cultivate a new way of seeing. Rather than the tribalism that excludes and punishes, this new narrative proposes a village that cherishes. In Cherished Belonging, Boyle calls us back to Christianity's origins as a subversive spiritual movement of equality, emancipation, and peace. Through colorful and profound stories brimming with wisdom, humor, and inspiration, we are invited to nurture

the connections all around us and live with radical kindness.

The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration by Isabel Wilkerson

From 1915 to 1970, an exodus of almost six million black citizens from the south to the north and the west forever changed the face of America. With stunning historical detail, Wilkerson tells part of this story of migration through the lives of three unique individuals, capturing their treacherous trips, their new lives in new places, and the ways they changed those places through their food, faith, and culture.

Changing Worship Colors

In our life together as church, we know what time it is by the colors used in our worship services. During Advent—the beginning of the new church year—either blue or purple is used. During the seasons of Christmas and Easter and other festival days, either white or gold becomes the primary color. During Lent, the penitent color of purple is used. On the Day of Pentecost, the color red reminds us of the Holy Spirit's presence as tongues of fire. And throughout Ordinary Time, green is used to remind us that we are always growing as followers of Jesus Christ.
