East and West Ohio Conferences to Commemorate MLK Day Together

Sunday, January 19, 4 pm Garfield Memorial UMC, Pepper Pike

The East and West Ohio Conferences of The United Methodist Church are coming together to honor the legacy of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. with a joint worship service on Sunday, January 19, 2025, at Garfield Memorial United Methodist Church in Pepper Pike. Themed "Living the Dream: Bold Faith, Hopeful Future," the event hosted by Bishop Hee-Soo Jung will focus on building Dr. King's vision of a beloved community rooted in justice, love, and hope.

The service, scheduled from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., will open with gathering music at 3:45 p.m. and feature retired Bishop Julius C. Trimble, General Secretary of the General Board of Church & Society of The United Methodist Church as the keynote speaker. Known for his commitment to justice and reconciliation, Bishop Trimble will offer a message of inspiration and challenge.

Music will be provided by Garfield Memorial UMC's praise band, setting the tone for a meaningful and uplifting gathering. The service will be live-streamed, allowing broader access for those unable to attend in-person.

Following the service, an informal reception will take place, offering light refreshments and opportunities for fellowship and conversation.

This event, which is free and open to the public, aims to inspire participants to carry forward Dr. King's God-given vision of unity and hope. "Our hope is that people will leave this worship experience inspired to build on Dr. King's vision of beloved community," organizers said. Join us as we celebrate the legacy of Dr. King and seek to embody his dream for a bold faith and hopeful future.

Volunteers needed



Cherished Belonging: The Healing Power of Love in Divided Timesby Gregory Boyle

Tuesday, January 7, at 7 pm in the Conference Room



Over the past thirty years, the Jesuit priest Gregory Boyle has helped to transform tens of thousands of lives through his work as the founder of Homeboy Industries, the largest gang-intervention program in the world. The program runs on two unwavering principles: 1) We are all unshakably good (no exceptions), and 2) we belong to each other (no exceptions). In this new book, Boyle argues that these two principles allow all of us to cultivate a new way of seeing. Rather than the tribalism that excludes and punishes, this new narrative proposes a village that cherishes. In Cherished Belonging, Boyle calls us back to Christianity's origins as a subversive spiritual movement of

equality, emancipation, and peace. Through colorful and profound stories brimming with wisdom, humor, and inspiration, we are invited to nurture the connections all around us and live with radical kindness.

The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration by Isabel Wilkerson


Rabel Wilkerson WARMTH OTHER SUNS

Poverty, by America by Matthew Desmond



The United States, the richest country on earth, has more poverty than any other advanced democracy. Why? Why does this land of plenty allow one in every eight of its children to go without basic necessities and authorize its corporations to pay poverty wages? In this 2023 book, sociologist Matthew Desmond draws on history, research, and original reporting to show how affluent Americans both knowingly and unknowingly keep impoverished people impoverished. This compassionate book gives us new ways of thinking about a morally urgent problem and helps us imagine solutions, beginning with collective belonging.

The Serviceberry: Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World by Robin Wall Kimmerer

Tuesday, April 1, at 7 pm in the Conference Room



As Indigenous scientist (and author of Braiding Sweetgrass) Robin Wall Kimmerer harvests serviceberries alongside the birds, she considers the ethic of reciprocity that lies at the heart of the gift economy. How, she asks, can we learn from Indigenous wisdom and the plant world to reimagine what we value most? Our economy is rooted in scarcity, competition, and the hoarding of resources, and we have surrendered our values to a system that actively harms what we love. Meanwhile, the serviceberry's relationship with the natural world is an embodiment of reciprocity, interconnectedness, and gratitude. The tree distributes its wealth—its abundance of sweet,

juicy berries—to meet the needs of its natural community, and this distribution ensures its own survival. As Kimmerer explains, "Serviceberries show us another model, one based upon reciprocity, where wealth comes from the quality of your relationships, not from the illusion of self-sufficiency."
