Loving Our Neighbors Collection for February

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) provides assistance to persons and communities following natural disasters or other crises. One way UMCOR offers relief is by providing affected persons with supply kits to help them as they strive to rebuild their lives. During the month of February, you are invited to participate in this relief work by donating items for "hygiene kits," which replace basic necessity items lost in a disaster and helping persons to stay clean and healthy. Please donate only the following items specifically requested. You can donate items to complete an entire kit or individual items which we will assemble in early March:

- One hand towel (between 15"x25" and 17"x27")
 - ♦ No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels
- One washcloth
- No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels
- One comb
 - $\diamond~$ Must be sturdy with at least four to seven inches of teeth
 - ♦ No pocket combs or picks
- One toenail or fingernail clipper
 - No emery boards or metal nail files
- Bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger)
 - ♦ No Ivory or Jergen's soap
 - Do not remove from packaging
- One adult toothbrush
 - ♦ Do not remove from packaging
 - ♦ Personal advertising not acceptable
- 10 adhesive bandages (3/4" x 3")
 - Common household bandages are acceptable
- One one-gallon size re-sealable bag

2024 Financial Report United Methodist Church of Kent

Through your generous participation, our congregation continues to make a significant impact within and beyond our local community. In addition to supporting our congregation's many ministries—worshiping, fellowship, and learning together—we have extended the reach of our love into the broader community by welcoming groups who regularly use our building. These include a variety of 12-step groups (e.g., AA, NA, Al-Anon), Kent Friends, Piano Quest, Kent Rotary, Kent Lions, PEO Chapter, Garden Club of Kent, Scouts (both Scouting America and Girl Scouts), Tree City Preschool, Kids Kare Kent Campus (daycare), and United Christian Ministries (campus ministry). Through your generosity, we are able to provide warm and welcoming spaces for community connection, sharing God's love and hospitality with our neighbors. Thank you for making this possible!

In addition, we have once again fulfilled our commitment to participating in the larger body of Christ through United Methodist apportionments (shared ministry) and financial gifts offered both locally and globally. In 2024, these contributions included:

- \$102,771 to support 101% of United Methodist Apportionments and Shared Ministry Goals.
- \$7,891 through "special giving" Sundays, including Human Relations Day, UMCOR Sunday, Native American Ministries Sunday, Peace with Justice Sunday, Blanket Sunday, World Communion Sunday, and United Methodist Student Day.
- \$16,595 to support other UMC-related missions, such as ZOE Ministries and disaster relief through the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR).
- \$21,955 to support local missions, including KIFA, LGBTQ+ Emergency Fund, Marie Miller House, Kent Social Services, KSS Food Pantry, Heart 4 the City, Pennies for Hunger, our youth programs, Beef Fund, County Clothing Center, and the gloves and mittens program.
- \$8,869 through the mission commitments and local giving of our United Women in Faith circle.

Your continued generosity and commitment enable us to be a light in our community and the world. We praise God for the impact we have been able to have together, and we remain committed to being faithful stewards of the resources God's grace entrusts into our hands. Looking ahead, for 2025, you have named financial commitments to support our continuing ministries in total of \$303,582, which is a 6.7% increase from 2024. Additionally, you have pledged \$48,540 toward our capital campaign, "Building Together for Tomorrow," which will provide new, more efficient heating units for classrooms in our Education Wing.

Thank you for your heartfelt generosity, prayers, and commitment to sharing Christ's love with others.


Ambassadors Football began in 1990 as Ambassadors In Sport (AIS) in Bolton, England. They continued as AIS until the current name was adopted in 2013. The ministry was founded by a small group of Christian college soccer players partnering with churches and Christian organizations to develop grassroots football (soccer) ministry. To this day, the work continues through football ministry training, football camps, clinics, prison ministry, school ministry, men's and women's teams, international tours, and global football event ministries including the World Cup. Ambassadors Football now has officers around the world, and through diligent prayer, calling, and research, continues to expand each year.

Bob Dean, a longtime member of our congregation who serves as the Director of Global Development for Ambassadors, will introduce local missionaries Matt and Olivia Warner (Matt is a Kent native who played soccer at Theodore Roosevelt) who serve in the North Hill section in Akron, and Ben Marias, the Director of Ambassadors South Africa. We invite you to hear their stories and witness, ask questions, and learn more about the inspired work of Ambassadors in our communities and around the world.

The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration by Isabel Wilkerson



Poverty, by America by Matthew Desmond



The United States, the richest country on earth, has more poverty than any other advanced democracy. Why? Why does this land of plenty allow one in every eight of its children to go without basic necessities and authorize its corporations to pay poverty wages? In this 2023 book, sociologist Matthew Desmond draws on history, research, and original reporting to show how affluent Americans both knowingly and unknowingly keep impoverished people impoverished. This compassionate book gives us new ways of thinking about a morally urgent problem and helps us imagine solutions, beginning with collective belonging.

The Serviceberry: Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World by Robin Wall Kimmerer

Tuesday, April 1, at 7 pm in the Conference Room



As Indigenous scientist (and author of Braiding Sweetgrass) Robin Wall Kimmerer harvests serviceberries alongside the birds, she considers the ethic of reciprocity that lies at the heart of the gift economy. How, she asks, can we learn from Indigenous wisdom and the plant world to reimagine what we value most? Our economy is rooted in scarcity, competition, and the hoarding of resources, and we have surrendered our values to a system that actively harms what we love. Meanwhile, the serviceberry's relationship with the natural world is an embod-iment of reciprocity, interconnectedness, and gratitude. The tree distributes its wealth—its

abundance of sweet, juicy berries—to meet the needs of its natural community, and this distribution ensures its own survival. As Kimmerer explains, "Serviceberries show us another model, one based upon reciprocity, where wealth comes from the quality of your relationships, not from the illusion of self-sufficiency."
